THE FOLLOWING ARE COMMENTS FROM PARENTS AND CAMPERS DEMONSTRATING THE IMPACT OF CAMPS:

"For one week every year, at Camp Quality, I feel completely normal. Everyone around me is my family and I can be anyone I want and feel accepted. I look forward to camp all year, and I wouldn't be who I am today. These people have changed my life, and they support me even when camp isn't in session." -- Former Camper Turned Adult Volunteer

"This past year my son (9y/o) has really started to ask questions about his heart issues. He has noticed other kids don't have the scars he has from open-heart surgery. He has started carina about being different, especially when other kids ask him about his scars. This was his first year at Camp Systole, and I don't think it hit me just how much he really needed this until we picked him up. He went on for hours about the people he met that had more scars than he did, the medical staff that talked to them all about their hearts, and the activities, crafts and games they participated in. He is very eager to go back next year and has grand plans already to be a CIT [counselor-in-training]." -- Parent of Camper

"I think it was the first time (my son) felt like being autistic wasn't a bad thing. On the way home, he said, 'I think I'm actually embracing my autism!' It made my heart so, so happy." - Parent of Camper

"It helped me to be able to talk to other kids my age who have been through similar experiences as me." - 13-year-old Camper

"As a mom of four wonderful children I know the importance of socialization, independence, friends who understand you and feeling 'normal.' For my oldest daughter these experiences were hard to find. Not a single other person in our hometown had spina bifida. No one she knew understood what it was like. She had to



watch as her sisters played sports, took swimming lessons and ran off to summer camp; until we found Camp MITIOG." -- Parent of Camper




OUR MISSION

CAMP CHANGES LIVES

The significant impact summer camp has on the children who attend cannot be overstated. It's been reported that children, on average, spend 4-7 minutes a day outside, while they spend 4-8 hours a day in front of a screen. Not only are they missing out on the benefits of nature, but they are losing the connection that comes from developing and navigating relationships with people face-to-face. Our camp partners remove kids from their devices and reintroduce them to nature and the arts. In addition, campers build self-confidence and independence and develop increased social skills and problem-solving skills. They learn to lead and to follow, to work as a team and to achieve as individuals. And for many, they discover that they are part of a community, that they can be themselves, and they can belong.

"I was shocked by all the other campers there. They weren't the same like all of the other kids in school. Some of them were bald, while others had scars or deformity. For once I felt like I fit in. I didn't need to think about my illness or what I had gone through. I was able to forget all about my past and find true happiness running around and getting to know everyone. Camp felt like a dream that allowed kids to do and be anything they wanted to be."
